Elder Abuse

ELDER ABUSE is any physical, sexual, or psychological abuse of an older person (generally age 60 - 65 years and older), and also encompasses neglect, abandonment, and financial exploitation. Elder abuse may be perpetrated by another person or an entity, and can occur in any setting—at home, in an institution, or in the community.D Older adults may be particularly targeted due to age or disability: isolation, reliance on caregivers, or decreased physical or mental capacity can increase older people's exposure and vulnerability to abuse. In addition, older adults—especially those on the brink of retirement—may be exploited financially due to their perceived resources. Reliable data on elder abuse is scarce due to very low reporting rates, a lack of research, and the hidden nature of this crime.






