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### Overview

The [U.S. Department of Justice](#) (DOJ), [Office of Justice Programs](#) (OJP), [Office for Victims of Crime](#) (OVC), seeks applications for a pass-through model in which a trauma-informed, survivor-connected technical assistance (TA) provider will provide TA, training, and subgrant funding for at least 10 sites that will receive subgrants. The sites will be identified through a request for proposals issued by the TA provider selected under this grant solicitation and will be funded at amounts between \$50,000 and \$100,000 each. The selected TA provider will assist and support communities across the country with establishing peer-to-peer support for crime victims and survivors. This program furthers the DOJ's mission by improving public safety by supporting victims of crime.

This solicitation incorporates guidance provided in the [OJP Grant Application Resource Guide](#) which provides additional information for applicants to prepare and submit applications to OJP for funding. **If this solicitation expressly modifies any provision in the OJP Grant Application Resource Guide, the applicant is to follow the guidelines in this solicitation as to that provision.**

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## Program Description

### Overview

OJP is committed to advancing work that promotes civil rights and racial equity, increases access to justice, supports crime victims and individuals impacted by the justice system, strengthens community safety, and protects the public from crime and evolving threats, and builds trust between law enforcement and the community.

With this solicitation, OVC seeks proposals to support a pass-through funding model in which a trauma-informed, survivor-connected technical assistance (TA) provider will provide TA, training, and subgrant funding and financial oversight for at least 10 subgrant sites. The sites will be identified through a request for proposals issued by the TA provider selected under this solicitation and funded at \$50,000–\$100,000 each. The selected TA provider will assist and support communities across the country with establishing peer-to-peer support for crime survivors and provide capacity building technical assistance for subgrantees.

### Statutory Authority

VOCA 34 U.S.C. 20103 (c)(1)(A)

### Specific Information

The concept of peer support is based on the belief that people who have faced, endured, and overcome adversity can offer useful support, encouragement, hope, and mentorship to others facing similar situations.<sup>[i]</sup> An analysis of existing research on peer-led group-based sexual assault interventions revealed that they have a positive impact on participants' psychological, physical, and interpersonal wellbeing.<sup>[ii]</sup> Peer support programs come in many different forms including independent peer-run programs, self-help and mutual support groups, or services delivered by peers working within issue-based organizations. The research suggests that peer-to-peer support leads to an increased understanding and acknowledgment of the impact of victimization, develops skills for overcoming trauma, and promotes survivors' capacity to achieve personal and collective healing.

Many communities of color and other underserved communities (e.g., people with disabilities, LGBTQ+) have had to create informal peer-to-peer counseling, advocacy, and networks because they were overlooked by systems, or did not want to be involved with more "mainstream" responses to intimate partner violence, health crises (such as AIDS), or workplace issues like harassment. As a result, peer-to-peer support has a deep historical foundation in communities of color and other marginalized communities—communities, which had to help themselves because of the barriers they faced to accessing systems or receiving adequate attention or care. Given this, OVC is particularly interested in peer support models that serve these communities and a TA provider with authentic connection to these communities.

The selected TA provider under this program will undertake the development of a competitive funding opportunity to provide subgrants to 10 communities. The TA provider will also assist and support communities across the country with establishing or expanding peer-to-peer support for crime survivors, which may be in the form of independent and peer-run programs, mutual support groups, mentoring programs, or peer-to-peer support within community-based organizations. In addition, the TA provider will be expected to provide support to the subgrantees on administrative and programmatic aspects of the peer-to-peer programs in order to build capacity of the subgrantees. Pass-through funds may be used to support new or existing support groups for survivors of all types of crime and to pilot test innovative or demonstrated support mechanisms for victims and survivors of specific types of crime (e.g., homicide, robbery, gun violence, mass violence, carjacking, hate crimes, etc.). The TA provider will implement a program to support the selected sites including technical assistance and capacity-building support. The TA provider will also be required to demonstrate that they are prepared and able to partner with other organizations that specialize in serving populations relevant to the selected subgrantees for which they do not have in-house expertise.

The TA provider will be required to conduct program evaluation activities to determine if the project was implemented as planned, identify areas of improvement, and document potential replicable methods for supporting survivors of crime. In addition, subgrantees for the peer-to-peer services will be asked to develop, conduct, and analyze voluntary, anonymous victim satisfaction questionnaires to guide program effectiveness and measure impact.

## **Goals, Objectives, and Deliverables**

### **Goals**

The purpose of this grant program is to create or expand peer support programs that are culturally and linguistically tailored to meet the unique needs of specific survivor populations, especially for survivors of those crimes for which existing support does not currently meet their needs. Specific goals include:

- Identifying innovative, or non-traditional programs specifically designed for the communities or populations to be served, which may lead to models that can be duplicated in other communities.
- Building the knowledge about, and community capacity to provide, peer-to-peer support options for victims of all types of crime.

### **Objectives**

An applicant should address all the objectives listed below in the Goals, Objectives, Deliverables and Timeline web-based form.

The objectives for this grant program are to:



- Provide technical assistance, training, and capacity building to support a minimum of 10 community sites that will create or expand peer-to-peer support programs to meet the individual needs of victims and survivors of crime.
- Conduct program evaluation activities to improve implementation and understand the potential impact of peer-to-peer support for victims and survivors of crime.

### **Deliverables**

The TA provider will produce the following deliverables:

- A competitive subgrant program to include a minimum of 10 community sites through a widely available Request for Proposals.
- Technical assistance and training to subgrantee entities to build capacity in using federal funds and to aid in establishing/expanding trauma-informed peer-to-peer survivor support programs to provide greater access to or enhance the quality of assistance and services to more victims of crime.
- A contractual agreement with an individual or an entity to provide program evaluation activities.
- A final report that documents the development strategy, the implementation process, and the impact/results/outcome of the program.

The goals, objectives, and deliverables are directly related to the performance measures that show the completed work's results, as discussed in the "Application and Submission Information" section.

Examples addressing this requirement include, but are not limited to, the following: budgeted project planning and/or implementation meetings with community stakeholders representing historically underserved and marginalized communities; outreach and/or public awareness campaigns specifically tailored to historically underserved and marginalized communities to encourage participation in the proposed project(s); budgeted incorporation of members representing historically underserved and marginalized communities in program evaluation, surveys, or other means of project feedback; and partnership with organizations that primarily serve communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality.

B. Applicants that demonstrate that their capabilities and competencies for implementing their proposed project(s) are enhanced because they (or at least one proposed subrecipient that will receive **at least 40%** of the requested award funding, as demonstrated in the Budget Web-Based Form) identify as a *culturally specific organization*.

To receive this additional priority consideration, applicants must describe how being a culturally specific organization (or funding the culturally specific subrecipient organization (s)) will enhance their ability to implement the proposed project(s) and should also specify which populations are intended or expected to be served or to have their needs addressed under the proposed project(s).

Culturally specific organizations are defined for the purposes of this solicitation as private nonprofit or tribal organizations whose primary purpose as a whole is to provide culturally specific services to racial and ethnic groups, including, among others, Black people, Hispanic and Latino people, Native American and other Indigenous peoples of North America (including Alaska Native, Eskimo, and Aleut), Asian Americans, Native Hawaiians, and/or Pacific Islanders.

### Proposal Abstract

A Proposal Abstract (no more than 400 words) summarizing the proposed project — including its purpose, primary activities, expected outcomes, the service area, intended beneficiaries, and subrecipients (if known) — must be completed in the JustGrants web-based form. This abstract should be in paragraph form without bullets or tables, written in

the third person, and exclude personally identifiable information. Abstracts will be made publicly available on the OJP and USASpending.gov websites if the project is awarded. See the [OJP Grant Application Resource Guide](#) for an example of a proposal abstract. If priority consideration is being requested, please indicate the priority area(s) 1A and/or 1B selected.

### **Proposal Narrative**

The Proposal Narrative should be submitted as an attachment in JustGrants. The attached document should be double-spaced, using a standard 12-point font; have no less than 1-inch margins; and should not exceed 25 numbered pages. If the Proposal Narrative fails to comply with these length restrictions, OVC may consider such noncompliance in peer review and in final award decision.

The Proposal Narrative must include the following sections:

a. Description of the Issue

Describe why this project/these proposed activities are necessary and/or address a need and include supporting information.

Define the nature and scope of the problem to be addressed, including relevant equity considerations for underserved communities. This description should include any available data (can use community data, Census data, client data to support) that is verifiable and/or contained in official records and use demographic data to describe and identify the populations that will be served. The description of the issue should also identify gaps in available data that the project intends to address through the needs assessment process.

Identify relevant underserved communities in their geographic area (if any) (can use community data, Census data, client data to support).

b. Project Design and Implementation

Describe the strategy for addressing the needs identified in the Description of the Issue. List the proposed program activities and describe how they relate to the stated objectives. Activities are the specific actions to be undertaken to fulfill the program objectives and reach the program goals. Provide a detailed description of the methods to be used to carry out each activity and how the deliverables described above will be completed. Provide a time-task plan indicating roughly when the activities or program milestones are to be accomplished. Identify which underserved communities (if any) will be served by the proposed project.

If the applicant is seeking priority consideration for Priority 1(A), it should address in this section how the proposed project(s) will promote racial equity and the removal of barriers to access and opportunity for communities that have been historically underserved, marginalized, and adversely affected by inequality, and identify how the project design and implementation will specifically incorporate the input or participation of these communities.

c. Capabilities and Competencies

Describe the capabilities and competencies required to accomplish the goals and objectives of the project.

Submit resumes for any key personnel and an organizational chart as attachments to the application.

Describe the qualifications, roles, and responsibilities of any new positions that will be created to staff the proposed project.

If the project includes subawards to project partners, include the name of the individual responsible for monitoring that subaward and the qualifications of the proposed partners to carry out proposed activities.

Describe the staffing plan for the project. Include the name, position title, and qualifications of the individual who will be the primary point of contact on the project and coordinate the day-to-day programmatic activities.

Describe previous or current experience providing services to survivors or assessing the service needs of a population. Applicants may specialize in one area of victimization or several as long as they can demonstrate that they have the necessary subject matter expertise, which may require having additional partners, consultants, or subrecipients.

Describe organization experience and capacity related to managing federal grants.

Describe how the organizations and individuals identified to implement the program (either project staff or partners) have the capacity and experience to implement project activities, including the expertise necessary to implement projects with the identified underserved communities. If the applicant is seeking priority consideration under Priority 1(B), it should describe within this section how being a culturally specific organization (or funding a culturally specific subrecipient organization at a minimum of 40% of the project budget) will enhance its ability to implement the proposed project(s), should also specify which populations are intended or expected to be served or have their needs addressed under the proposed project(s), and should include the website address (if applicable) and formal or informal mission statement or principles of the culturally specific organization.

d. Plan for Collecting the Data Required for this Solicitation's Performance Measures

Describe the process for measuring project performance. Identify who will collect the data; who is responsible for performance measurements; and how the information will be used to guide and evaluate the project's impact. Describe the process for accurately reporting data.

It compiles a variety of laws, rules and regulations that affect the financial and administrative management of DOJ awards. This guide serves as a starting point for all award recipients and subrecipients of DOJ grants and cooperative agreements in ensuring the effective day-to-day management of awards.
