NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation received 17,351 claims (does not include sexual battery forensic examination), which is an increase of 18.53% over the last annual fiscal period. This change is attributed to the Victims of Crime Act (VOCA) Assistance grant which received a substantial increase in funding which generated opportunities for more programs and more victim service practitioners. With additional sub-grants given to state and local law enforcement and community organizations, the number of referrals to compensation increased, and thus more victims were served.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The process is initiated when a Victim Compensation Claim Form and a law enforcement report from the proper authorities (some exceptions apply) is submitted to the department. The form is data entered into the system used to manage compensation claims, assigned a number, and reviewed by a trained claims analyst to determine if the eligibility criteria pursuant to law is met. If the claim is determined eligible, compensable expenses submitted with the application are addressed, and/or the victim/applicant is notified to submit compensable expenses for payment consideration.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The increase of the Victim of Crime Act (VOCA) grant provided a substantial increase in the number of sub-grants given to state and local law enforcement and community organizations. More and more advocates were hired by those organizations, and thus, more advocates were trained by the Bureau of Victim Compensation. As a result, the number of referrals to compensation increased and a heavier workload was absorbed which slowed down the average processing time for eligibility determinations from 17 days to 22.5 days.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation continues to maintain excellent rapport with the FBI, U.S. Attorney's Offices, and advocates affiliated with different branches of the armed forces by attending meetings, offering presentations, facilitating training, and working collaboratively in response to mass shootings deemed federal jurisdiction. The department also responded to requests for information from the International Terrorism Victim Expense Reimbursement Program (ITVERP) to ensure there is no overlap in compensation.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation developed and launched a web portal for victim advocates and treatment providers to learn more about how requests for compensation are processed, get answers to frequently asked questions, find forms needed to expedite claim activities, and obtain publications. The web portal also enables users to register and receive access to online application and/or treatment invoice submission. Advocates can track the status of applications they've submitted, and treatment providers can see the status of invoices. This greatly increased the capacity for web portal users to assist victims and improved communication.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

The Bureau of Victim Compensation did not use federal VOCA funds for administrative purposes during this reporting period. All administrative costs are paid using funds acquired through the state's Crime Compensation Trust Fund.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

Florida's legislature passed Chapter 960.194, Fla. Stat., during annual fiscal period 2016-17, to administer loss of support benefits higher than the maximum claim cap of \$25,000, to the surviving family members of emergency responders who were killed in the line of duty. The Bureau of Victim Compensation processed four "Emergency Responder Death Benefits" during this period and paid \$50,000 to the families of each of those officers.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

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The Bureau of Victim Compensation continued its partnership with the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Florida Counsel Against Sexual Violence, numerous state agencies, faith-based community representatives, and local law enforcement agencies to provide support for victims and assistance with filing victim compensation claims.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

Public outreach is completed by offering continued education to victim advocates, service providers, law enforcement support staff, and community partners who engage victims of crime. The Bureau of Victim Compensation deployed a dedicated trainer to facilitate compensation discussions at both Victim Services Practitioner Designation Training, and Enhancing Victim Services Through Victim Compensation Training, which are offered multiple times throughout the state each year. The trainings became so popular that additional opportunities for training were offered. By providing this resource, a greater understanding about the programs and benefits administered through victim compensation was developed.
