Legal services were funded at a prioritized level during the reporting period. These services increased access and improved service delivery to several populations of crime victims, including domestic violence victims, LGBT crime victims, immigrant crime victims, and elder crime victims. These needed and valuable services have been delivered in a meaningful manner throughout the reporting period to crime victims who may not otherwise access due to the traditionally high costs associated with these services.
Please discuss each priority (i.e., child abuse, domestic assault, sexual assault, and underserved) in which VOCA funds have been used to assist crime victims during the reporting period
VOCA funds have been used to assist victims of child abuse in the following ways: 1) by funding CASA volunteer coordinator salaries, transportation, and program supplies to provide child victims with representation in their best interests in court, 2) by funding child advocacy center programs, including multidisciplinary team coordination, equipment, and secondary victim support services, 3) by funding on-call time for a pediatric sexual assault nurse examiner in the state's largest city. VOCA funds were used to assist victims of domestic assault by funding 1) legal services, 2) shelter operations and services, and 3) outreach and service coordination efforts. VOCA funds were used to assist victims of sexual assault by supporting 1) rape crisis center operations and services, 2) on-call sexual assault nurse examiner time, 3) a large statewide program that coordinates services for victims of human trafficking. In addition, VOCA funds support coordination efforts and direct services provided by both the Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault Coalitions. Underserved victims were assisted by VOCA funds through the support of 1) culturally specific community-based organizations, including the Latino Coalition Against Domestic and Sexual Violence, 2) language lines and interpretation services, 3) bilingual staff.

The State utilized its website as well as a subscriber-based listserv to publicize its victim assistance funding during the reporting period. In addition, management and executive staff spoke throughout the state to potentially eligible entities to encourage them to apply for victim assistance funding during the reporting period.

During the reporting period, mainstream funding was complemented by newly funded organizations that provide services to underserved populations in innovative and culturally accessible ways. This was accomplished by cultural organizations identifying the need for services among LGBT, Hispanic/Latinx, Deaf/hard of hearing, and immigrant and refugee populations and then implementing programming that reaches these populations in safe and culturally significant ways. An example of this programming is a non-residential service design with an understanding of the additional barriers and challenges and the implementation of efforts to mitigate them.

During the reporting period, the State was able to respond to gaps in services by funding new programs, allocating funding to supplement state domestic violence funding, and funding coordination efforts among service providers.
