The fund that receives deposits from state criminal fines and penalties continued to experience a decrease in monthly deposits. Due to this fact payments issued by the compensation program were held until deposits were made that allowed the fund to issue the payments.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

CVAD has relationships with victim-witness coordinators in both the Northern and Southern Districts of Iowa. We also work closely with the FBI victim specialist in Iowa. When there is a victim of a federal crime we rely on those relationships to help ensure our program information is made available to victims. Compensation staff is also in regular communication with those individuals when seeking an application from a Federal crime victim.

lowa used VOCA Administrative funds to support 3 Compensation Specialists. The Compensation Specialist positions directly improves our ability to provide compensation because the primary function of the position is to work with victims to process their application and make payments on crime-related expenses.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

Yes, the lowa legislature authorized a new benefit which allows the CVC to consider additional compensation above the maximums set by law when the victim has to deal with a new event related to the criminal justice proceedings from the crime that made them eligible for the program. A new event includes re-trial, multiple trials for multiple offenders, parole/release from incarceration, re-sentencing. A victim cane be compensated for expenses up to the maximum in the current benefit category if they have hit the maximum, or the benefit was not available at the time the application was submitted. The legislature also created a standard definition of "survivor of a deceased victim" to clear up discrepancies in the benefits available. Under prior code certain relationships of survivors were eligible for different benefits. It is now standard that all survivors are eligible the same benefits.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

lowa VOCA Assistance funds are administered out of the same office as the lowa Victim Compensation program. This allows for strong coordination among staff administering both programs. We conduct frequent trainings with our partners in law enforcement and prosecution at the local, state, and federal level to ensure victims are made aware of the compensation program. Our statewide DV and SA coalitions provide training to new victim advocates working in programs funded by VOCA Assistance dollars. Compensation staff is given the opportunity to participate in those trainings. In addition, state law allowed the compensation program to reimburse community-based victim service programs for expenses paid on behalf of eligible victims for relocation assistance. CVAD has done significant training for program staff at all levels to grow understanding around how to submit payment information to the compensation program; what is allowable for the compensation program; and the differences between VOCA Assistance funds and VOCA Compensation funds.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

Crime Victim Assistance Division staff conducted training and outreach efforts statewide. Audiences include law enforcement personnel and cadets, victim assistance programs and advocates, prosecutors and victim-witness coordinators, criminal justice classes, hospital social workers, mortuary service providers. We staff tables at a variety of conferences and distribute program information.
