1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**
No, no significant change since last year. Any change in most part would be due to being able to track the data in our database more accurately
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Upon receipt of our claim form, the CVC receptionist date stamps the claim and forwards the claim form to our Intake Processor. The CVC Intake Processor thoroughly examines all claim forms to determine if all sections have been completed and all required documentation has been submitted. The Intake Processor enters all data into our electronic database and drafts claim acceptance letters (all claims that are filed are accepted for review), letters to County and/or Commonwealth's Attorneys advising them of a claim having been filed, and deficiency letters to the Claimant advising them on all missing information. After the intake process has concluded, all claims are forwarded by the Intake Processor for investigation. All claims that are filed with the Commission are thoroughly investigated. The investigative process is multifaceted and includes, but is not limited to, the following: discussions are had with law enforcement officials and/or County and/or Commonwealth Attorneys to determine the circumstances surrounding the crime; missing documents are requested; all service providers are contacted to verify balances due and owing and to determine any out of pocket payments made by our Claimants; receipt of various court documents; discussion with the Claimant. After the investigative process has concluded, all claims are then assigned to one of our three Commission members for his/her recommendation on the claim. Once the Commission member has tendered a recommendation, the Commission's clerk then generates a Recommended Findings of Fact, Conclusions of Law, and Order based on the Commission member's recommendation. Once a claim has had a Recommended Order drafted and is ripe for placement on one of the Commission's monthly agendas, the Recommended Order is mailed to the Claimant, County and/or Commonwealth Attorney, and private counsel of the Claimant, if applicable. Upon the Recommended Order being mailed, the Claimant has 15 days with which to register a written appeal of the recommendation to the Commission. At the regularly scheduled Commission meeting, the full Kentucky Claims Commission discusses all claims on the agenda, including any appeals, if any are filed, and issues a Final Order. The Final Order is then mailed to the Claimant, County and/or Commonwealth Attorney, and private counsel of the Claimant, if applicable. All appeals of a Final Order tendered by the Commission are to be filed in Circuit Court within 30 days of the date that the Final Order is mailed

Decreasing funds due to lower court cost collections and finding a revenue source to replace them is our greatest issue at this time.

The Kentucky Claims Commission maintains a good working relationship with advocates from the two US Attorney's offices, who refer to us those victims in need.

As in years past the 5% administrative fund was used to send employees to the national conference for continuing education. Without this funding we would not be able to get this training.

The Commission's CVC clerk currently sits on the Kentucky SVAA Steering Committee, which is currently in the process of developing a 40-hour residential training program for individuals that work with crime victims across multiple "disciplines", including but not limited to: new programs, prosecutor-based advocates, community-based advocates, system-based advocates, and allied professionals.
