Program staff works closely with the Federal Bureau of Investigation and the United States Attorney's Office to ensure eligible victims are afforded the opportunity to apply for compensation benefits. Program staff routinely communicates with victim/witness coordinators from these agencies to ensure that staff is appropriately notified of the existence of these victims, and coordinates with said individuals to ensure receipt of required law enforcement records needed for purposes of establishing program eligibility.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**  
No new notable activities were incorporated into the victim compensation process during this reporting period.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**  
Administrative funds were used exclusively for reimbursements to victims and/or claimants or to pay directly to providers on behalf of victims and/or claimants.

9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**  
Throughout the grant cycle, program staff works with state, federal and tribal officials to obtain information needed for eligibility purposes and to improve coordinated efforts to ensure eligible victims are afforded an opportunity to apply for compensation. Staff routinely participates in statewide law enforcement trainings, and routine provides technical assistance to law enforcement personnel, prosecutors, criminal justice officials and victim assistance coordinators. Training continues to be an ongoing and integral component of the Division. A total of 13 trainings were done during this time period. Those trainings and/or events included, Sexual Assault Nurse Examiner (SANE) Training through the Mississippi Coalition Against Sexual Assault, Health Occupations Students of America, Catholic Charities, Jackson State University, Mississippi Social Work Institute, Mississippi Opioid Summit, Mississippi Coalition Against Domestic Violence Language Access Training, Juvenile Justice Symposium and faith based organizations, Gulf Coast Center for Non-Violence. The Division continues to co-host and/or participate in Annual Crime Victims' Rights Week Events and the Annual Tree Lighting Ceremony. During these events, individuals from across the state come together to remember, honor and pay tribute to victims of violent crime; to bring awareness to the needs of and services for crime victims; to promote the Crime Victims' Bill of Rights; and to recognize the many individuals who provide much needed services and assistance to victims and survivors alike.
