NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**

The number of applications received increased 31% from FFY17 to FFY18. Albuquerque, New Mexico continues to be rated as a U.S. city with the most violent crime per capita. Our two year filing extension appears to also still be contributing to the increase in compensation applications as our state CYFD and CASA programs are still submitting child abuse related claims at a high rate. We continue to provide outreach and trainings throughout the state to ensure all victim service providers are up to date on all current NMCVRC policies and procedures.
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Applications are received by mail, fax or email. They are date stamped and sent to the compensation analyst within one work day for database entry, creating files, assigning a state investigator and sending letters to hospitals, law enforcement agencies, employers, etc. This stage may take three to five days depending on the number of applications coming in. On day five, the file is given to the victim advocate who has three working days to contact the victim/family member to find out their immediate needs, provide resources in respective area's and review the compensation process. That brings us to day 9 to possible +3 months when all the necessary documentation is received and the state investigator reviews the file to determine eligible expense, works with their supervisor on any issues regarding the case, contacts the victim/family member/service providers letting them know the status of the application and what other expenses they may have. Once the police report has been received and reviewed, on average within 30 days, either a decision can be made or supplemental information may be requested if the report is ambiguous, which may take another 30 days. A decision can be an approval, partial approval or denial. The state investigator contacts the victim/family on the decision, the appeal process (if partially approval or denied), what billing can be processed, what remains on hold and if approved, when to expect a mailed check (within three to four weeks).

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**

We continue to see a large number of requests for relocation and rent assistance. We included eligibility for these expenses to survivors of homicide where the crime occurred in the household. Our working relationships with VOCA Victim Assistance funded non-profit agencies throughout the state continues to be a positive solution to ensure timely payments to landlords, property managers, utility companies, and others who provide relocation services.
5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**

NMCVRC provides outreach and training to Federal victim service providers. We continue to collaborate with federal agencies on a multi-disciplinary team in efforts to determine needs and provide services to victims of sex trafficking and labor trafficking. Our agency continues to enhance collaboration with the Coalition to Stop Violence Against Native Women to address the needs in Indian Country. We have strong relationships with our local FBI and Homeland Security victim advocates who provide referrals and supporting documentation for crimes that occur on Indian Country and federal lands. This ensures timely eligibility determinations and processing of incurred expenses.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**

NMCVRC conducted a July and September Academy for Victim Assistance. This provided basic victim advocacy training to over 100 advocates throughout New Mexico in District Attorney's offices, Child Advocacy Centers, law enforcement advocates, shelter advocates, and sexual assault advocates. This training provided overviews from New Mexico's Coalition of Sexual Assault Programs, Coalition to Stop Violence Against Native Women, New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence, New Mexico Attorney General's Office, and many other programs who provide services to victims with disabilities, victims of human trafficking, child victims, transgender services, and victim compensation services.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**

VOCA administrative funds are used to pay portions of agency rent, phone, vehicle lease, and travel. These funds continue to support our agency operational needs to process compensation applications. Travel provides our staff abilities to provide outreach and training of victim compensation and VINE services. Staff are also able to attend national trainings, such as the National VOCA Conference in Georgia. These trainings allow staff to stay up to date on best services and also learn what services are being provided in other states throughout the country.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**

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We were successful in passing legislation that has added Failure to Render Aid to our enumerated crimes. This is a point of discussion in all victim compensation trainings and has been well received. This has allowed our program to begin paying on incurred expenses such as funeral, medical, lost wages, and others.

9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**

NMCVRC participates in several multi-disciplinary teams such as Human Trafficking Task Force, Intimate Partner Death Review Team, and the Albuquerque Family Advocacy Center. Each of these have active members from federal, state, tribal, law enforcement, and non-profit service providers. These collaborative efforts allow for discussions of gaps in services and potential solutions. Our agency gains further access to information which has allowed streamlined eligibility determinations.

10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**

NMCVRC continues to provide outreach and training services to ensure most updated information regarding victim compensation is available. Failure to Render Aid and NM VINE have been our most recent topics to our outreach efforts. We continue to have the ability to provide training to new probation and parole cadets, victim advocate volunteers in the state's largest judicial district, and volunteers throughout the state who serve as Court Appointed Special Advocates. In addition, as stated in question 6, NMCVRC conducted a July and September Academy for Victim Assistance.

81 days on average to process an victim compensation application, 65% care and support payment to providers, 100% care and support payment to individual victims

12. **Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.**

We continue to have conversations and dialogue with the Coalition to Stop Violence Against Native Women, New Mexico's Coalition of Sexual Assault Programs, New Mexico Coalition Against Domestic Violence, New Mexico Child Advocacy Center Children's Alliance, and the New Mexico Child Advocacy Network to improve and change legislation which would further assist and support services to victims. As an example, removing statute which requires victims report incidents to law enforcement within 30 days (180 for domestic violence/sexual assault) and instead requiring a report being made to law enforcement at any point and continued cooperation with the investigation and legal process.
