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NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

Pennsylvania has experienced an increase in the number of claims during this reporting period. For 2016-2017, Pennsylvania received 6,328 applications. For 2017-2018, a total of 7,276 applications were received. This is an additional 948 claims for 2017-2018. It is believed that this increase in claims is a result of the substantial increase of VOCA assistance funds. These additional funds have allowed grantees to enhance/expand their services. While grantees are required to notify victims of compensation, many did not have the resources to aid in filling out the form with the victim. The increased funding has allowed more programs to allocate resources to this much-needed benefit.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 88

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Pennsylvania counts average processing time from the date the application is received until a first-time decision is made to either pay or deny. If after 60 days, the claimant has failed to submit proper documentation, the claim can be placed into an inactive status which does stop the counting for average processing time.

- Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

During the rating period, the continued increase of VOCA Assistance funding to local victim service agencies has created more discussion around the area of compensation and more local agencies looking to work more with compensation victims throughout the process. Pennsylvania continues to strengthen our outreach to legislators and citizens to better educate them on compensation and help them understand that no state tax dollars are used to fund the program. We continue to try and find new ways to conduct this outreach.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Pennsylvania continues to work with federal partners to ensure crime victims needs are met. Cross border issues continue to be a discussion topic when the crime occurs in two (2) or more states.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

Pennsylvania worked with the Department of Treasury to allow providers to have their payments electronically deposited. This allows for payments to be made faster to providers.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

The administrative funds are used to partially support the salary and benefits of two staff persons. One of these individuals, a claim specialist, works directly with the Victims Compensation Assistance Program claim process. This process includes determination of eligibility, the verification process, making decisions and the preparation of recommendations. This staff member works directly with victim service groups, service care providers, law enforcement agencies, Clerk of Courts, District Attorney Offices, and victims/claimants compensation claims received daily. The second position provides clerical support for the VCAP. This position assures that all data and bills for incoming claim forms are entered daily and gives Emergency Awards priority status for entering into the claim processing system. This position also assures that all incoming mail is opened and logged, mails acknowledgement letters to victims and claimant, sends notices of decision to victims and claimant and the victim service agencies, and provides assistance to other staff with responsibilities such as filing and copying.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

During this reporting period, there were no changes regarding compensation. However, changes have been drafted to the current Crime Victims Act with the hopes of expanding benefits in the future.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

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The Victims Compensation Program and State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator are both within the same office in Pennsylvania. There is a very close working relationship. The Victims Compensation Assistance Program Manager attends staff meetings of the Victim Service Program that houses the VOCA Assistance Coordinator. Since the Deputy Director now oversees both areas, it provides a better source of communication among the programs. This is an ideal working situation which quickly addresses any barriers that may arise. Victims compensation also works closely with partners to ensure barriers are addressed immediately. Through committee structures at the Pennsylvania Commission on Crime and Delinquency, staff have access to Criminal Justice Advisory Boards which have the ability to coordinate with law enforcement, courts, etc. The PCCD, Office of Victim Services also has a very good working relationship with the Pennsylvania District Attorneys Association to quickly address barriers that may arise with prosecutor offices.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

Pennsylvania continues to promote victims compensation using its own website, newsletter articles, pamphlets, brochures (especially the law enforcement brochures that were developed for law enforcement to provide at the time of the crime, and various other outreach such as presentation and conference participation. Compensation staff spent a week at the Pennsylvania Farm Show handing out information to attendees. Additionally, staff participated in several legislative community events in which information related to Victims Compensation was shared.
