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### NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

During the past fiscal year, we actually increased the number of application in a 7% percent. That number represented 123 new applications. This is an important finding because for the past 3 years the number of cases showed a decreasing pattern. We implemented an outreach strategy that started on April 2017 which immediately showed a 3% increase in the upcoming trimester.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. •After receiving the claim a control number is assigned and referred for investigation and processing to a Compensation Technician. After investigating the veracity of the victim claim and gathering the required documents to support it, the Compensation Technician submits an approving or denying recommendation. When the case is considered favorably for approval by the Compensation Technician, it is submitted to the Claim Adjuster who will then refer the case for final review to the Director, before proceeding to submit the approved claim to the Financial Division for payment. Finally, the claim goes to the Treasury Department who emits the check that will be handed to the claimant. In the event of a recommendation to deny the claim, the case will be reviewed by the office Sub director for final determination. In both situations a final resolution is sent to the claimant informing him or her of the final decision after reviewing the claim. The Office informs to every participant that submits a claim, that he or she can submit a request for revision with the Attorney General, should they not be in accordance with the Office determination regarding the amount to be reimbursed or the denial of a claim. Explain the responsibilities of your office in processing a claim: When processing a claim is our responsibility to assist the claimant to obtain certain documents, such as police reports, documents from social security and other information pertinent to the case in consideration. As part of the responsibilities not only the Office assess the merits for approval or denial of a claim but offer follow up to service suppliers to ensure the rapid delivery of service or goods, depending on the nature of the claim and the service to be provided. As a part of the Office responsibilities we focus on the follow up with the PR Treasury Department as well as with the Federal Finances Division in PRDOJ, to account for the timely disbursement of benefits to the claimants.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

We suffered from two hurricanes that affected our ability to actually insert ourselves in the community as was our plan for this year. On the other hand, PR fiscal situation limited the use of state funds considerably.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

No victim of federal crime were reported to Victims Compensation Division during this period for compensation benefits.

We provided close to 15 conferences and informing sessions to general public and also to specialized personnel in the criminal justice system. We also had activities in National Victims' Rights Awareness Week. This past year the focus intervention with under age victims of sexual abuse.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

We used the VOCA administrative funds to provide training to our personnel in order to help them improve their knowledge of the victim's compensation program.

Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

During the past year efforts were made to facilitate a seamless transition in cases from Victims Assistance to Victims Compensation. Service technicians were trained, regarding state law and VOCA requirements for victim's compensations and increasing the amount of referrals for compensation evaluation. This proved to be effective in increasing the number of new cases received in victim's compensation. We also trained prosecutor in specialized divisions of the PRDOJ, such as Economic and Fraud Division and the specialized division that prosecutes DIU.

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10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The Office have a continuous presence in the community through our "Community Impact Project" (P.I.C.) in which not only we assist victims of crime in the process of submitting compensation claims in coordination with the Assistance Division of the office, but also we provide conferences to community groups, schools, churches or other governmental agencies and non-government organizations interested in learning about the services provided by the Compensation Division of our Office.
