Transportation will continue to be a key issue in the state due to there being so many rural areas due to a lack of transportation providers. Language barriers is also an issue. Many of the VOCA grants are working with cultural populations to help with language barriers by hiring individuals that are fluent in languages such as Spanish.

Task forces and Coalitions depend heavily on the support of businesses and private donations to support community efforts where grant funds can not be used.
