Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The application is received and checked for completeness. Once the application is deemed complete, letter to law enforcement and providers are sent for verification of the information submitted on the application. When the law enforcement report is received in our office it is reviewed to ensure the information matches the application and that the crime is a compensable crime. We also ensure that the claimant/victim has not contributed to the crime or was not committing an illegal act during the crime as well. Once all of that information has been verified, an approval or denial decision is made.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

There were no majors issues or trends that impacted our program's ability to meed the needs of victims during the reporting period.

South Dakota Victims' Services staff work closely with Victim Specialists from the FBI and US Attorney's Office within the state to ensure Federal crime victims are served.

^{6.} Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

During the 2018 Legislative Session, a bill was passed to move the Crime Victims' Compensation program from the Department of Social Services to the Department of Public Safety. This has helped to improve the relationship between the CVC Program and Law Enforcement agencies when investigating claims.

7. Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

VOCA administrative funds are used to pay salaries and benefits for the Program Manager, Program Assistant, and two Investigators. VOCA funds continue to be a vital part of the South Dakota Crime Victims' Compensation Program. This year we were able to make payments on all eligible claims.

^{8.} Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

During the 2018 Legislative Session, a bill was passed to move the Crime Victims' Compensation program from the Department of Social Services to the Department of Public Safety. This has helped to improve the relationship between the CVC Program and Law Enforcement agencies when investigating claims. A separate bill was also passed to increase a surcharge that funds the Crime Victims' Compensation program on a state level. The surcharge was increased from \$2.50 per crime to \$5.00 per crime.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

South Dakota Victims' Services works closely with personnel within the criminal justice system in South Dakota to reduce barriers for victims applying to receive crime victims' compensation. Personnel throughout the system coordinate efforts to assist victims through the entire process. South Dakota Victims' Services staff maintain contact with victims that apply for victim compensation, victim specialists and other personnel communicating with victims throughout the claim process.

^{10.} Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

South Dakota Victims' Services staff are available to provide training and technical assistance for programs as requested. Additionally, staff work with grantees to assist with any questions. Posters, brochures, and applications are distributed to agencies throughout the state. South Dakota Victims' Services hosted 3 workgroup sessions with various advocates from around the state to discuss ways to improve the application process and how we can better serve the victims with our program.
