Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The process is initiated when a Victim Compensation Claim Form and a law enforcement report from the proper authorities (some exceptions apply) is submitted to the department. The form is data entered into the system used to manage compensation claims, assigned a number, and reviewed by a trained claims analyst to determine if the eligibility criterion pursuant to law is met. If the claim is determined eligible, compensable expenses submitted with the application are addressed, and/or the victim/applicant is notified to submit compensable expenses for payment consideration.
3. **Does your state have a victim satisfaction survey?**

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**  
The Bureau of Victim Compensation paid \$19,329,618 during this federal reporting period which is an increase of 22.4% over last year's \$15,791,396. Sadly, collections from restitution, fines, and fees at a statewide level have not increased to support that trend and the bureau no longer had sufficient funds to pay claims at those levels. Therefore, effective September 1, 2019, the Schedule of Benefits was reduced to address the shortage in payments from criminal defendants. All claims with crimes committed on and after September 1st are paid at lower rates and with smaller benefit caps.
5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**  
The Bureau of Victim Compensation continues to maintain excellent rapport with the FBI, U.S. Attorney's Offices, and advocates affiliated with different branches of the armed forces by attending meetings, offering presentations, facilitating training, and working collaboratively in response to mass shootings deemed federal jurisdiction. The department also responded to requests for information from the International Terrorism Victim Expense Reimbursement Program (ITVERP) to ensure there is no overlap in compensation.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**  
The Bureau of Victim Compensation launched the Initial Contact initiative. Claims analysts are expected to telephonically reach out to every victim/applicant on all new victim compensation and/or property loss claims for purposes of gathering information, offering explanations, and providing instructions. It is our hope that this initiative will improve communication and the overall understanding of what the program can offer.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**  
The Bureau of Victim Compensation did not use federal VOCA funds for administrative purposes during this reporting period. All administrative costs are paid using funds acquired through the state's Crime Compensation Trust Fund.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**  
Florida's legislature revised sections 960.07(2), 960.13(1), 960.195 (1)(b), and 960.196(2), Fla. Stat., to increase the timeframes within which victims have to report crimes to the proper authorities, and file claims for compensation for incidents occurring on or after October 1, 2019. The Bureau of Victim Compensation revised technical qualifications in 2A-2.002, F.A.C., training materials, publications, and forms to accommodate those legislative changes. The impact will likely affect the number of claims received which will be monitored over the next several years.
9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**  
The Bureau of Victim Compensation continued its partnership with the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence, Florida Counsel Against Sexual Violence, numerous state agencies, faith-based community representatives, and local law enforcement agencies to provide support for victims and assistance with filing victim compensation claims.
10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**



Public outreach is completed by offering continued education to victim advocates, service providers, law enforcement support staff, and community partners who engage victims of crime. The Bureau of Victim Compensation deployed a dedicated trainer to facilitate compensation discussions at both Victim Services Practitioner Designation Training, and Enhancing Victim Services Through Victim Compensation Training, which are offered multiple times throughout the state each year. The bureau also continued to publish posters offered in English, Spanish, and Creole, as well as a brochure which are distributed at training and to VOCA funded partners, as well as making them available to the public on our webpages at [www.MyFloridaLegal.com](http://www.MyFloridaLegal.com) and <https://VANext.MyFloridaLegal.com>.

All Division of Victim Services and Criminal Justice Program departments, which includes the Bureau of Victim Compensation, file an Annual Report with the Governor and Legislature. That report provides an overview of activities and includes the total number of claims received, amounts paid, and calls resolved. It also includes the total amount received from all state funding sources including surcharges, court costs, fines, restitution and subrogation activities, and compares those amounts with the total paid by judicial circuit. 12. **Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.**

Many states, including Florida, have announced budget shortfalls due to diminished collections at statewide levels. Revising federal regulations as it pertains to the formula could provide greater capacity for state compensation programs to administer awards directly to crime victims. A revision to the federal grant formula by singularly increasing the percentage would be a welcome change.
