Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. NH Victims Compensation Program receives applications for crime-related assistance directly from a victim or an advocate or health care professional working with a victim. Applications are processed and opened within 2-3 business days upon receipt. The program staff forwards an acknowledgment letter to the claimant, which contains the claimant's claim number and requests supporting documentation, when applicable, and provides the claimant with information concerning debt collection delay for crime-related expenses. Staff requests police reports and completion of a Law Enforcement Authority Verification Form from the law enforcement agency investigating the crime. Upon receipt of the police reports, the claim is marked as commission ready and the program coordinator reviews each claim for eligibility and makes a recommendation in accordance with New Hampshire law and Administrative Rule. The coordinator submits the reviewed claims to the New Hampshire Victims Compensation Commission for review and decision. The Commission meets once a month, in a non-public session and reviews, discusses and votes on each commission ready claim to award, reduce, deny or table the claims. Immediately following the Commission meeting, program staff contact the claimants in writing concerning the Commission's decision. Claims that are awarded are provided with an explanation of benefits form. Claims that are denied, are provided with information on how to appeal the denial.

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**

The New Hampshire Victims Compensation Program has encountered no emerging/major issues or notable that affects this program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**

The New Hampshire Victims Compensation Program has an excellent working relationship with the Victim/Witness Advocate at the N.H. U.S. Attorney's Office. Moreover, we work seamlessly with the local FBI pertaining to victims of federal crimes.

6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**

The NH Victims Compensation Program most notably improved victim services in NH by increasing some program caps and revising the administrative rules that govern this program. The improvements consist of: (A) Increasing the cap for crime-related counseling from \$3,000 to \$4,000. (B) Increasing the cap for funeral and grave marker expenses from \$5,500 to \$7,000 and \$3,000 for interment; and, (C) Adding to the assistance for victims of sexual assault by paying for any other crime-related injuries, direct billed by the hospital to the program, on the first day of the sexual assault examination. The proposed changes were recently submitted to the New Hampshire Joint Legislative Committee on Administrative Rules for review and approval. On October 17, 2019, the rules were conditionally approved and will be implemented in the next reporting period.

7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**

12. **Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.**

The New Hampshire Victims' Compensation Program strives to improve victim services. It is our desire to add additional benefits (such as childcare) however; we do not have the funding to meet this need. We are increasing some monetary caps as detailed in question # 6 above, however, there is currently local legislation pending to increase the program's overall cap from \$30,000 to \$40,000. This increase, combined with the expansion of some of the program's individual caps, prevents us from adding additional services without additional funding. It is the hope that Congress and OVC will reevaluate reimbursement rates to compensation programs and increase VOCA funds for compensation programs by changing the statutory allocation formula, as proposed by NACVCB.
