We partner with the victim specialists in the FBI and US Attorney's local offices, and attend regular meetings with them.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**  
We have been out in the community more, and created a "mobile office" where we can set up at an off site location and fully process applications. We have been able to answer more questions directly and assist in completing applications by going to places we know victims frequent such as police stations, courts, hospitals, and welfare offices.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**  
We previously used Administrative funds for partial salary coverage. Beginning with fiscal 2020, we will shift that to assist with training, conferences, and operations costs. This will allow our staff to better serve victims as they will be trained on new issues they face. Without this funding, staff would not be able to attend training or conferences as the program has a very limited budget for expenses other than claim payouts.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**  
Relocation payments for rent in a new apartment were limited to funds needed for first 2 months and security deposit. Previously, we paid \$5,000 toward rent on nearly all approved relocation claims.
9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**  
We have strong partnerships in the private sector with many victim service agencies, as well as most police departments within the state, and the attorney general's office. We are in constant communication with them and both attend and host training sessions to learn more about what they do, and so they can learn more about our program to help them feel more empowered with their victims to navigate the process. We also take on most of the burden of document gathering ourselves to make the process as seamless as possible for victims
10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**  
As mentioned in the answer above for question 6, we have created mobile office days. On these days, staff set up at an off site location such as a hospital, police station, court, welfare office, etc. The staff make their presence known and proactively seek out victims who may not already know about the program. Staff are able to answer questions directly, assist in completing applications, and begin processing them while off site.
