#### Describe any program policies changed during the reporting period.

There were no FG&P policy changes made during this reporting period. However, there was acknowledgement that updates to program policies were needed to adjust Federal Grants and Programs approach to work due to the changes in staffing number & capacity, workload reallocation, workflow, and to account for the change to a new online grant management platform. Critically important given that several positions were to remain unfilled while duties/workload has been absorbed by remaining staff and positions.

#### Describe any earned media coverage events/episodes during the reporting period.

As the SAA, we have not had any earned media coverage during this reporting period.

### Describe any coordinated responses/services for assisting crime victims during the reporting period.

The Federal Grants & Programs Division coordinated with victim service providers across the state during the year. The Nebraska Victim Advocacy Coordinator served on the Board of Directors for the Nebraska Coalition for Victims of Crime that is comprised of victim service professionals from various types of victim service agencies. The CVR Program Administrator and the Nebraska Victim Advocacy served on the steering committee for the new Nebraska Victim Assistance Academy (NEVAA), provided input on trainings provided by the academy, and assisted with their facilitation. The Federal Grants & Programs Director and the Nebraska Victim Advocacy Coordinator both participated in the Tribal Coalition meetings, Statewide CRT, and other efforts.

#### Please discuss the major issues in your state that either assist or prevent victims from receiving assistance during the reporting period.

In January 2023, LB760 was enacted, appropriating state funding to the Crime Commission to award a grant to an organization, institute of higher learning, or other such entity which provides training for victim advocates in the State of Nebraska. Qualifying programs are required to provide 40-hours of free, nationally accredited, victim advocate training.

#### Please describe ways that your agency promoted the coordination of public and private efforts within the community to help crime victims during the reporting period

The Federal Grants & Programs Division participates in various boards, committees, and work groups across the state that promote collaboration on victim services. This is done by attending meetings and/or conferences that the separate coalitions have as a time to share information and stay informed on what is happening with victim services in Nebraska.

## Please describe any notable activities at the grantee level during the reporting period that improved delivery of victim services.

Victim service providers continued to provide services, even with staffing shortages or turnover. Staff handled increased and more complex workloads. Providers adapted services an sought available resources to ensure victim needs were being met. Victim service providers continue utilizing technology and collaboration to improve or expand on services delivered. Processes were continually adapted and evaluated to ensure victim safety.

## Please discuss each priority (i.e., child abuse, domestic assault, sexual assault, and underserved) in which VOCA funds have been used to assist crime victims during the reporting period

During this reporting period, Nebraska funded 18 CASA programs and 7 Child Advocacy Centers to provide services to victims of child abuse and child sexual assault. VOCA funding in Nebraska also provides funding for the Sexual Assault Payment Program that pays for SANE exams of all sexual assault victims in the state. Nebraska also funded 26 domestic violence and sexual assault programs that are located throughout the state. Of those programs, four of them are recipients of the Transitional Housing funding that serves victims of domestic violence and underserved populations. There are also 12 victim witness programs that are located either in the county attorney office or with law enforcement. These programs are typically exclusive to 1 or 2 counties and there are 93 counties in Nebraska. VOCA funds are also used to fund a couple of statewide programs to provide the criminal justice advocacy that victim witness units typically provide. The Nebraska Probation system has advocates that work with the victims of probationers in various locations across the state. The next program we use to meet this underserved need is the Nebraska Victim Advocacy Program (NVAP) that has a statewide Victim Advocacy Coordinator who provides advocacy to crime victims in frontier and rural Nebraska where services are not available or easily accessible. NVAP also has a direct victim assistance fund that provides resources, services and assistance to victims of elder abuse.

#### Please briefly describe efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal crime during the reporting period.

Programs that receive VOCA funding are required to serve victims of federal crimes at the same level they do all other crime victims. This information is provided in the funding announcement, special conditions, and is reviewed during monitoring activities.

#### Please identify any emerging issues or notable trends affecting crime victim services in your state during the reporting period.

Budget and staffing concerns are a primary issue.

## Please briefly outline any staffing retention issues that your victim assistance program has and why these issues may occur during the reporting period.

Our program has faced and continues to face a substantial reduction in staff due to the decrease in VOCA funds. This has been addressed through attrition and leaving vacated positions unfilled, but also by layoffs. During 2022 and 2023, Federal Grants and Programs sustained a greatest impact to our number of team members. In September 2022, one month prior to this reporting period beginning, our FG&P team of 9 decreased to a team of 6 with the resignation of our Criminal Justice Grant Section Administrator, the layoff of our Victim Training Specialist, and the layoff of a Grant Manager produced noise monitoring of our subrecipients. None of the vacancies created by these positions were to be filled. In March 2023, a Grant Manager resigned who primarily managed VOCA subgrant projects. In May 2023, our longest tenured Grant Manager resigned. In July 2023 we hired two new Grant Managers to fill the March and May vacancies, but our Director of Federal Grants and Programs resigned. In August of 2023, the Operations Assistant stepped into an Interim Director role until the Director position could be permanently filled. However, another tenured Grant Manager resigned, followed by the resignation of one of the two July newly hired Grant Managers resigned leaving one existing Grant Manager and the Operation Assistant acting as Interim Director. In October 2023, the Operations Assistant was promoted permanently to the Director of Federal Grants and Programs, creating a vacancy for the much-needed support staff position, and two additional Grant Managers were hired to the FG&P team. There is a major concern for staff retention moving forward. The limit placed on the number of staff budgeted for FG&P, the increased workload per staff member resulting from the reduction in staffing capacity, non-competitive pay offered by the State, and the end to hybrid/remote work from home options for State Employees due to Executive Order 23-17 Bringing Nebraskas a Public Servant Workforce Back to the Office all present challenges for F

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### Please explain your state process to publicize its victim assistance funding for services to victims of crime during the reporting period.

Funding opportunity announcements for VOCA are primarily announced on our Nebraska Crime Commission website. Announcements and applications are made available through our online grant management system. Funding opportunities are emailed out to all existing Nebraska Crime Commission state and federal funded grant programs, coalitions, and stakeholders. We ask emailed recipients to pass on funding opportunity information to other agencies that would qualify and benefit from VOCA funding. Toward end of this reporting period, NCC leadership began discussion of future 2024 community outreach via meet and greets that would provide greater exposure to NCC Staff, the services we provide, and funding opportunities available to benefit crime victim stakeholders.

#### Please explain how your state is able to direct funding to new/underserved populations during the reporting period.

Applicants serving new/underserved populations were given strong consideration. Some existing programs were expanding services for underserved populations such as victims of human trafficking. One newly funded project is solely serving the underserved population of elder victims of crime. One project provides legal immigration services and mental health services to immigrants and refugees who are victims of a crime or persecution. Another project is a hospital-based violence intervention program for victims of assault.

#### Please explain how your program is able to respond to gaps in services during the reporting period.

Our program works to identify gaps in service throughout the grant cycle. This information is gathered by coordinating meetings and working with our allied professionals across the state of Nebraska, through the monitoring process, and the PMT system. The result of this collaboration is assisting the victim service agencies by either adjusting the current grant scope to provide more effective services or to fund activities in the next grant cycle that will address these gaps. Recognizing the 40% reduction in VOCA funding and the impact on financing service delivery, we encouraged applicants to research and apply for other funding opportunities offered by the Crime Commission to aid in closing the anticipated funding gap resulting from the decrease in available VOCA dollars.
