NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

Alaska s crime compensation program saw a significant drop in applications over the last few years. Prior to 2020, on average the Violent Crime Compensation Board (VCCB) was receiving around 1,000 applications a year, in FFYs 2020-2022 that number decreased significantly, averaging only 660 applications per year, with FFY 2022 receiving only 544 applications. Alaska's crime rates have not declined at the same rate. Therefore, this was not a product of less need, but rather a result of significant challenges VCCB faced over the past few years. In 2020 VCCB moved from Juneau to Anchorage in an effort to be more accessible to the majority of claimants. This resulted in a complete turnover of staff and board, with positions yet to be filled. The loss of technical expertise and historical knowledge created a gap, not easily filled. A few years later, in 2022, the agency transferred from the Department of Administration (DOA) to the Department of Public Safety (DPS). This was a great benefit, but the agency has experienced administrative transition challenges such as access to past accounting information. This has since been resolved. Another contributing factor may have been the pandemic. With less accessibility to training advocates and providers, there may have been less assistance given to victims with the VCCB process. In recent months, steps have been taken to rectify these issues. A great deal of support has come from the DPS to provide assistance while we are understaffed. A training curriculum has been developed and VCCB is planning to provide a training with our state victim assistance agency (CDVSA), Tribal technical assistance provider (ANWRC), as well as Alaska s Network for Domestic Violence and Sexual Assault to provide statewide training and outreach. As of October 1, 2022, VCCB has already received over 60 applications. If the current trend remains, the agency should meet or exceed 2019 application rates.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The average length of time to process an application is just an estimate. VCCB is currently working through an extensive backlog in cases, this means many still have yet to have a resolution date. --High-Level Overview of Claim Process -- When an application is received, an electronic claim file is created in the CCVC system. The paralegal begins gathering information needed to determine eligibility and understand the victim's needs. Requests for information are sent to the law enforcement, hospitals, doctors, employers, and other service providers as well as the applicant. The information that is needed will depend on what expenses are being requested. A police report is required before a determination can be made as to whether compensation can be paid for the claim. However, when a police report is not available, the paralegal will contact law enforcement to obtain information such as a Law Enforcement Questionnaire (LEQ). Once all the necessary documentation is received, there are two pathways forward: If the case meets basic eligibility requirements and the victim has requested an emergency award, we can ask the Board for an emergency award. This is limited to \$5,000 (per statute) and can only be applied to: -Inability to work -The need to relocate for safety reasons -Mental health therapy expenses -Making or paying for funeral arrangements -Medical or dental expenses -Security measures that will provide a level of safety -Transportation expenses In cases of homicide, two eligible persons may apply for an emergency award if both have incurred an undue hardship because of the crime. Example: Son is murdered and parents are responsible for funeral and burial expenses. If each parent files a claim and are deemed eligible, the VCCB may award up to \$5,000 to each claimant for funeral and burial and transportation related to the funeral or burial. The amount of the emergency award is counted toward the overall claim cap of \$40,000. If the necessary documentation has been received and the victim has not requested an emergency award, the claim is presented at the next Board meeting for approval. If the claim is provided to the Board and the claim is awarded, payments are processed accordingly. If the claim is denied, the claimant has an opportunity to appeal, in which case a hearing will be held before the Office of Administrative Hearings.

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

Understaffing at VCCB has been the primary challenge when it comes to meeting the needs of victims in Alaska. The lack of adequate staff has led to not only delays in processing applications, but also an inability to train advocates throughout the state on the VCCB process. When advocates are not equipped to properly assist victims, applications are not appropriately filled out leading to further delays in the process. Similarly, when we are unable to do outreach and education, rural Alaskans suffer most. Without access to social services, there is less awareness of resources and assistance throughout the process. VCCB hopes to fill some of this gap by partnering with new Tribal Victim Advocates as they get set up throughout the State. VCCB has already discussed with Alaska Native Women's Resource Center (ANWRC), a technical tribal assistance agency, how we can best collaborate to meet the urgent and long-term needs of victims.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

VCCB frequently works with the FBI and US Attorney's Victim Witness Coordinator to provide assistance to individuals who are working with law enforcement and prosecution. Applications from these agencies tend to be more complete and easier to forward directly to the board for approval. Both of these agencies are familiar with the VCCB process and assist in expediting referrals from their agency by providing required backup documentation and communicating frequently with VCCB staff. In addition to referrals from federal agencies, the new executive director of VCCB serves on the Governor's Council for Missing and Murdered Indigenous People (MMIP) as Vice Chair and participates bi-weekly in the MMIP workgroup run by the US Attorney's Office MMIP Coordinator. Through these two workgroups, multiple listening sessions have occurred with Tribes and rural communities throughout Alaska.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

Current staff were not present for the majority of reporting period FFY22. However, one significant change was the transfer of VCCB to DPS. Being part of DPS has led to a significant increase in access to needed resources and information required to process claims. As part of DPS, VCCB can receive information on crimes within days, whereas in the past it could take months for open cases. Similarly, VCCB developed a Law Enforcement Questioner (LEQ) to be used when a police report is not available. This allows law enforcement to provide necessary information to process a claim without divulging aspects of the incident that may make a case vulnerable.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

No federal administrative funds were spent in FFY22. VCCB has just started spending some federal funding, but everything has been in compensation to claimants.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

No. Not directly for compensation.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

As stated in a prior response, VCCB works frequently with the FBI and US Attorney's Office in multiple capacities. In addition to working with advocates and coordinators at other agencies, VCCB has an opportunity to strengthen its partnership with the State District Attorney's Office. In Alaska, there is currently a plan to set up Victim Witness Paralegals and a Coordinator throughout the state. With training, this should assist in getting victims assistance throughout the criminal justice process.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The VCCB released a statement through the Commissioner of DPS explaining delays in processing payments due to being understaffed. This information was also passed to all victim assistance agencies through CDVSA the stated assistance administering agency. It was also posted as a special notice on the main page of VCCB's website.

With all new staff, prior reports to the Governor are not available. All other metrics have been reported through the PMI reports.

VCCB has appreciated the assistance received by both the State Administering Agencies Support Team, as well as the VOCA Center. With all the transition Alaska's compensation program has faced over the last few years, it was necessary to have outside expertise to assist with best practices and creating a foundation for moving forward.
