NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**
 During this reporting period, a total of (6) applications were submitted for victim compensation. This number is 1 application less received from the prior reporting period (Apr - June 2022); however, the average remains consistent throughout the fiscal year.
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**
 Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 365

 Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. The average lifetime for an application to be either approved/denied by the Criminal Injuries Compensation Commission Members is about 365 days, or 1 year. However, the actual lifetime for each application may vary due to a variety of factors: 1) The status of the criminal case; 2) Pending documentation/information from each applicant as necessary, and the length of time that the program receives such documentation/information; 3) the scheduling of Commission hearings subject to the availability of Commission Members; and 4) other administrative processes. The procedure for processing an application is as follows: 1) New applications are received by the Victim Advocates and forwarded to the victim compensation Coordinator; 2) the Coordinator reviews each application and is entered into a database (spreadsheet) by the Coordinator; 3) Based on findings, the Coordinator will make a recommendation to the Commission to either award/deny the applicants' request; 4) the Coordinator will meet with the program's assigned attorney to debrief on applications received, their findings, and recommendations; 5) the Coordinator will prepare and submit either a Letter of Eligibility or a Letter of Ineligibility to each applicant. 6) If potentially eligible, the Coordinator will request to schedule a meeting (interview) with the applicant to review their request and request for additional documentation/information as needed; 7) the Coordinator schedules Commission hearing with the Commission Members, subject to availability, and informs respective applicants of the scheduled hearing date; 8) the Commission Members will make a decision to award/deny each application based on the findings and recommendations made by the Coordinator. The facts and decisions are documented by the Coordinator.

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**
 Pursuant to 8 GCA Chapter 161, during this reporting period, the program was unable to provide compensation to applicants for one or more of the following reasons: 1) The application was not filed within 18 months from the date of injury; 2) The applicant(s) were not listed as a class of persons contemplated in the statute to receive compensation; and/or 3) The crime(s) involved in the incident were not listed in the list of violent crimes that applicants may receive compensation for.
5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**
 Not applicable. The Criminal Injuries Compensation Program (victim compensation program) does not service victims of federal crime.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**
 During this reporting period, the victim compensation program scheduled a total of (1) Commission hearing in which Commission Members made decisions to either award/deny applications. During this reporting period, a total of (15) cases/applications were scheduled for the hearing; whereas, (8) applications were approved; (2) applications were continued; and (5) applications were denied.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**
 During this reporting period, VOCA Administrative and Training funds were utilized to send (2) staff to attend the New Administrator Academy for VOCA Compensation in September 13-15, 2022 in Denver, Colorado.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**
 During this reporting period, there were no laws, initiatives, or policy changes regarding victim compensation.
9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**

The victim compensation Coordinator regularly coordinates with the Victim Advocates in collecting case updates relative to each application, as well as contacting the applicants/victims for required documentation/information to support their claim, and/or scheduling of meetings with the Coordinator. Pursuant to 8 GCA Chapter 161, the Commission is mandated to deduct/offset any amounts that the applicant has received for compensation from sources, including restitution. Therefore, the Coordinator receives updates from the court for information regarding restitution payments for applicable cases. The Coordinator regularly communicates with an assigned attorney to the program in receiving legal guidance to ensure compliance with the program's statute.

10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**

The Victim Services Center participates in outreach events to raise awareness of the victim compensation program, also referred to as the Criminal Injuries Compensation Program (or "CICP"). The Victim Advocates also inform the victims of crime of the CICP, as well as assist with the application process as necessary.

The victim compensation Coordinator submits semi-annual reports to the Legislature of the Commission's activities including the name of each applicant, a brief description of the facts in each case, and the amount, if any, of compensation awarded. Each semi-annual report is inclusive of the following reporting periods: 1) January 1 - June 30; and 2) July 1 - December 31 of each year.
