1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

There has been no significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 58

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Upon receipt of an application, clerical staff inputs the data into the CRMS system and creates a physical file. If medical records &/or billing need to be requested, requests are generated and sent out. Police reports are subpoenaed and upon receipt, the case is assigned to an investigator. The investigator reviews the case and if any follow ups are required, they are done at this time. The investigator prepares the decision and order to deny or award acknowledgement award &/or any expenses that are verified; if additional expenses require verification, case is left open for additional award. The decision and order is approved by the executive director and clerical staff sends a copy of the decision and order to the applicant/victim. If there is an award, case goes to admin assistant for payment. Once purchase order is generated and approved and processing for payment via FAMIS is done, case is either filed appropriately or returned to the investigator. When there are no further crime-related expenses to be paid out or the maximum award amount is reached, the case is closed.

3. Does your state have a victim satisfaction survey?

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The Commission was provided funding for positions during the 2022 legislative session and was able to hire additional staff late in the reporting period. Additional staff has allowed the Commission to work on case backlog while maintaining services to incoming applicants.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The victim advocates in the State of Hawai`i meet on a quarterly basis. The Commission attends these meetings which are attended by the advocates from the FBI and the U.S. Attorney's Office, as well as representatives from the military. Having this relationship with the federal advocates makes it easy to work with them to assist federal crime victims. Additionally, the Commission has handled cases referred by the Department of Homeland Security and the U.S. Attorney's Office during this period.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The ability to hire additional staff during the 4th quarter of this reporting period has allowed the Commission to work on backlogged cases that were unable to be worked on during the staffing shortage. While the Commission worked hard to ensure that current cases were being processed as effectively and efficiently as possible, followups on older cases were lower on the priority list and therefore were unable to be handled as quickly as possible.

7. Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

The Commission did not use VOCA Administrative funds during the reporting period due to the uncertain nature of collection amounts from the Compensation Fee, the Commission prefers to use 100% of the grant funds for direct compensation for victims.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There were no legislative changes to the Commission's governing statute nor any initiatives or policy changes affecting victim compensation during the reporting period other than the administrative impact of moving the funding source for the Commission's positions which was done via the budgeting process.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

During the quarterly meeting of victim advocates, any issues that may have arisen during the time between meetings is able to be discussed and reviewed. The Commission works closely with the County Victim Assistance Programs who provide the largest percentage of compensation applications. If any questions arise about an application or if services are required such as translation of applications or decision and orders, the Commission works with the referring advocate to ensure the victim receives the information needed in the language required. The Commission also works with the Adult and Juvenile Client Services Sections of the Judiciary to ensure that the Commission is able to get restitution ordered back for payments made on behalf of victims and to ensure that the Commission is providing assistance for all eligible expenses.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

The Commission has provided training on its program and services as follows: 01/2022 - Training for Hawai`i County Victim Witness Counselors; 03/2022 - Training for Honolulu County Victim Witness Counselors; 07/2022 - Training for Sex Abuse Treatment Center administration and staff; 09/2022 - Training for the Hawai`i State Victim Assistance Academy participants. On a national level, the Commission's Executive Director (ED) has presented on the Commission's successful Restitution Project and on it's Mass Violence Plans. The ED has presented at: 10/2021 - National Center for Victims of Crime's National Training Institute 2021; 11/2021 - National Crime Victim Law Institute; 06/2022 - National Association of Crime Victim Compensation Boards' National Conference; and 09/2022 - 2022 National Association of Victim Assistance in Corrections Conference.
