NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**
 The number of claims applications received during this reporting period is down 7%, on average, when compared to the previous reporting period. Our program experiences cyclical patterns in claim submission volume, with submissions peaking during the late summer and into the fall, dropping down to lower levels of volume in the winter. It is possible that there was a higher than typical increase in claims submitted during fall 2021 as covid restrictions began to relax in NYS. Now that most covid restrictions have been lifted, our program has not seen dramatic month-to-month claim volume changes as we did during the height of covid.
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**
 Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 117

 Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Upon receipt of a claim application, either electronically through the Victim Service Portal, or via paper submission, the claim is assigned to a Crime Victim Specialist (CVS). The CVS will request documentation to establish eligibility and render a decision. Some expenses could be paid in the original decision. If additional documentation is needed for medical expenses, the claim will be referred to the Medical Reimbursement Unit where staff will then reach out for additional information and process any further medical expenses that arrive in the future.

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**
 When comparing the volume of claims submitted in this reporting period to the previous period, claim submissions have not varied significantly. The downward trend in claim submissions over the past ten years appears to have leveled-off slightly, even accounting for the sharp decline in claim submissions during the height of covid (spring through fall 2020). Despite this leveling-off of claim submissions, there does not seem to be the same trend regarding requests for emergency awards: the monthly volume of emergency award requests has not decreased in the past ten years as much as compensation claims, nor has it decreased in the past two years. Even during the height of covid, there was a two-month period (April and May 2020) with very low emergency award requests, but the volume of requests increased to pre-covid volume in the months following, reverting to levels not previously observed since 2016 (when claim volume overall was significantly higher). These trends in claim submissions, regardless of crime type or claim type, have an impact on program operations because when emergency award requests are received, staff need to shift focus from working on conventionally submitted claims to processing emergency awards.
5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**
 OVS continues to work with the FBI and neighboring states to prepare for mass casualty events. In this reporting period OVS collaborated with such entities during mass casualty events that occurred in Buffalo, and in Brooklyn.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**
 OVS Compensation Program has continued efforts (via a permanent business analyst position) to map current workflows and analyze business processes to determine where improvements in efficiency would be most beneficial. OVS has been working internally to streamline claims processing by creating specialized roles to allow staff to become subject matter experts in eligibility determination and medical bill payment. We anticipate these changes in roles and responsibilities will allow specialized staff to render eligibility decisions and pay bills faster.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**
 OVS primarily uses VOCA Compensation administrative funds to support staff that are dedicated to the processing of claims and compensation payments. These funds also support operational expenses such as translation and language access services, records management, call center support, and shipping expenses. These funds are essential to our ability to continue providing quality services to victims of crime and to process claims applications in a timely manner. The majority of OVS staff dedicated to compensation activities continue to be State funded with State administrative support approximately 4 times higher than the administrative amount available to New York via the Victim Compensation award.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**

Relates to the direct reimbursement to medical providers for services to sexual assault survivors (L.2019, c.681 and L.2020, c.55) by establishing the rules and process for applying for and making such reimbursement. 9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**

OVS has long-standing, ongoing working relationships with other state agencies and VAPs to ensure the agency can obtain records necessary to process claims in a timely manner without placing the burden on victims to obtain information. OVS has an Advisory Council that meets quarterly that allows open discussion between OVS personnel and external stakeholders to address any barriers to victim compensation activities. The Division of Criminal Justice Services is an ex-officio member of the Advisory Council providing valuable criminal justice expertise to council discussions.

10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**

OVS staff usually attend various community events and participate at information tables at several conferences throughout the state. This has been limited during the previous year, but we have begun to send staff to events again. During this period OVS hired a Community Engagement Liaison (CEL) who has been regularly meeting with state and regional stakeholders. The CEL has also been leading a comprehensive Victims of Crime Needs Assessment and Gap Analysis (VOCNA). The work will be completed by the Council of State Governments Justice Center who won a competitive award for the purpose of conducting a comprehensive analysis that highlights gaps in services and can inform OVS future outreach efforts in a more targeted manner towards pre-identified goals. OVS also meets routinely with our NYC counterparts, our regional coalition members, our advisory council. OVS also routinely partners with funded programs to highlight National Crime Victim's Rights Week activities. OVS also routinely attend conferences to highlight our activities and work with elected officials to highlight our efforts and services available in their constituencies.

12. **Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.**

OVS encourages OVC to consider decoupling the federal compensation award from state spending. If the goal is to serve as many victims of crime as possible perhaps a test could be included to ensure that states have not reduced their commitment to the program. The federal award a state receives should not be based on prior year spending numbers which fluctuate based on the timing of the payments of claims and is not even necessarily reflective of the number of claims submitted in any given year.
