# <sup>1.</sup> Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

There was a nearly 400 application increase over last year s application submissions. The increase in applications is likely due to targeted outreach with agencies who assist victims with submitting applications and a large-scale incident which resulted in approximately 50 applications submitted in association with a single investigation.

# 2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 90

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once an application is received and confirmed complete enough to process, the application is entered into our software program. Letters are sent to requesting documentation from claimants, law enforcement, county attorney's offices and providers. Once the law enforcement reports and completed law enforcement verification forms are received, a victim is contacted requesting they schedule an interview with our office. Once the telephone interview is complete, a recommendation is made to the CVC Board for them to review at their monthly meeting. The CVC Board makes all determinations for claims to be approved or denied. After the Board meets, letters are sent to the Claimants to notify them of the Board's decision.

# <sup>4.</sup> Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The CVC software transition that began in FFY 22 has continued during FFY 23. Improvements to processing continue to be made. Additionally, there was staff turnover during this FFY, which inevitably impacts any program. Finally, Kansas CVC went through the OIG Audit, primarily during a period when there were staff vacancies. This impacted the program s ability to meet the needs of crime victims due to the cumbersome nature of the audit.

# <sup>5.</sup> Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Kansas CVC continues to have a strong partnership with the U.S. Attorney s Office and Victim Specialists with the FBI. During this FFY, we had several face-to-face and virtual meetings to discuss Crime Victims Compensation and how we can better serve the victims working with those offices. Additionally, those offices have reached out to us multiple times to brainstorm certain complex cases to see if Kansas CVC can assist. In most of those cases, Kansas CVC was able to find a way to help the victims, or make a referral to a non-profit agency that could, if it were an expense not compensable by state law

# 6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The Kansas CVC application was revised during FFY 2023 to provide more open space, make some sections more concise, and add options for victims to identify a contact person that Kansas CVC can call if attempts to reach the victim were unsuccessful.

### 7. Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

No VOCA Administrative funds were used. All VOCA match funds expended during this reporting period were used for claim payments.

# 8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

No laws or initiatives were passed during FFY 2023. Several policies were written and adopted during FFY 2023 regarding completion of the VOCA VCC Form and financial grant management.

# 9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

Kansas CVC staff continue to have strong working relationships with system-base personnel within the Kansas criminal justice system to enhance services and reduce barriers to victims who may apply for compensation. All CVC staff frequently communicate with offices in the CJ system and communicate suggestions back and forth to enhance victim access.

During FFY 2023, approximately 400 people were trained by Kansas CVC throughout the state. Outreach this year was conducted both virtually and in-person for a variety of organizations including victim advocacy organizations, the Kansas Academy for Victim Assistance, nurses, and District and County Attorneys.
