When we receive an application from the claimant, it is entered into our database, and the information is solicited from the appropriate resources such as police departments, medical reports, mental health treatment plans, sexual assault forensic exams, and employment verification. This can take a lot of research and interaction with providers in order to get the necessary information. Once we have supporting documentation, the entire case is reviewed for validity and awards are calculated and submitted to the board. The board meets monthly and will approve or deny the cases, in which case the claimant is notified. Of note, in calculating the average length of time to process an application, we have excluded those claims that are over 365 days with the reason being that the claimant re-opened their claim that was previously withdrawn (ex. A claimant submitted an application in 2015, but their insurance covered their medical expenses so the claim was closed/withdrawn. Then in 2022 they request to re-open their claim in order to receive compensation for counseling. Our current database calculates from the original date of application receipt, as opposed to active processing time, and skews the data.)

3. Does your state have a victim satisfaction survey?

Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

Funding for our program comes from assessments on criminal convictions. Our revenues had been falling due to a fall in the crime rate and the decriminalization of certain offenses. We are seeing an increase in the utilization of mental health treatment as well, likely due to the shift in social acceptance of therapy. Covid-19 also impacted funding, as the courts re-opening with a backlog of cases resulted in most being processed to deferred dispositions, which results in no financial assessment.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

We provide the same level of service to victims of State crimes and Federal crimes. We work closely with the Victim Services Coordinators for the U.S. Attorney's office on individual cases and training.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

We monitor for improvements to database functionality, and due to a technology grant we have begun to replace and improve our database. We have offered training to the Police Academy, Sexual Assault Forensic Nurses, Victim Witness Advocates, and local allied resource centers in order to educate on how better to extend our services and support to victims.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

We have used administrative funds for STACAP charges (approved indirect cost ratio). STACAP charges are mandatory state assessments against draws from funding sources other than the State General Fund. We must pay these charges when we make payments from Federal funds as well as when we make payments from State funds, which are also not State General Funds dollars.

We collaborate with all listed allied professionals, within and without the State and Federal criminal justice systems, on ordering and collecting restitution. We collaborate with these entities on training.

We have found that direct outreach to the general population does not generate eligible cases. We provide training and support to allied professionals. We have, and continue to, expand the scope of outreach and training to allied professionals.

Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.

The federal grant funds available to Maine are a small amount and inhibit the ability of the program to grow due to the increase in applications and utilization of funds. Due to the decriminalization and shift in crimes, Maine has less state funds to use, which means a smaller match from the federal grants, which detrimentally impacts the program's ability to support victims of violent crimes.
