1. Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.

There were no significant changes to the number of applications received during this reporting period.

2. The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Survivors of violent crimes that have occurred in the Commonwealth have three years from the date of the crime, if a minor up until their twenty-first birthday or when the incident was discovered and a criminal indictment was filed to apply to the Compensation program. Upon receipt by email, fax or mail, all applications are reviewed for completeness by the Intake Assistant. Any missing information or reports are requested and received before assignment to an Eligibility and Outreach Coordinator. All applications are entered into our confidential database that is available only to Division staff. Applicants receive an initial letter acknowledging receipt of their application and are provided with a confidential claim number and debt collection protection letter during the pendency of their claim. All standard applications are reviewed by an Eligibility and Outreach Coordinator. Any additional information is gathered during this period regarding the crime, cooperation by the applicant and any contributory contribution issues that have been noted. If approved, applicants receive an initial eligibility letter detailing the next steps for expense submission and the assignment of an Investigator/Advocate to their claim. If denied, the applicant receives a denial letter and outline of their appellate rights. Denied applicants may file a Request for Administrative Reconsideration with the Program Director or file a Judicial Appeal in the district court where they reside either after the Program Director's decision on appeal or in place of an administrative review. Claimants have thirty days from the date of the Division's decision to file an appeal. All judicial appeals are de novo hearings and decisions are final. In the case of homicide applications, they are reviewed upon receipt by our Senior Investigator/Advocate in carrying out the intent of M.G.L.c. 258C, s.2(e) by verifying the status and nature of the crime as a homicide, obtain a law enforcement report listing the victim as the victim of a homicide, the crime occurred within the Commonwealth, and the application was received within three years from the date of the crime. This allows the payment of verified funeral and burial expenses to be paid prior to a full review of the application by an Eligibility and Outreach Coordinator, as outlined above.

- Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

Our program continues to serve the needs of all victims and survivor families for their uninsured, crime related expenses. We continue to monitor the requests for expenses currently not covered by the program as well as those currently capped expenses where the costs are rising due to inflation and other costs. The staff will then work with our internal government team to advance any related statutory or regulatory changes to increase the support being offered.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The Division continues to actively work with our federal partners in an effort to inform survivors of crime of the assistance that it can provide. This involves our Victim Specialists at the United States Attorney's Office, Federal Bureau of Investigations and Homeland Security. We provide support through trainings and case consultations, on an as needed basis. In addition, we remain involved with military services through our representation on the Military, Veterans and Families subcommittee meetings of the Governor's Council on Domestic and Sexual Violence.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

The Victim Compensation Division continues to review the governing statute and regulations in an effort to continue the implementation of best practices for the compensation of crime related expenses for survivors of violent crime. OVC s recommendations regarding We anticipate reaching out to other states and work with the National Association of Crime Victim Compensation Board to identify national trends that are also being encountered in our state. This will allow the Division to consider upcoming changes to address the needs of such survivor groups as human trafficking victims as well as those survivor groups that we have been serving.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

VOCA Administrative funds continued to be used for the purpose of providing outreach materials and our brochure/applications in addition to our annual Victim Rights Awareness month calendars. This year s calendars reached over 1200 law enforcement agencies, domestic and sexual assault service programs, housing programs, elder service agencies, medical centers and other victim service agencies. Compensation staff were also able to attend the national VOCA conference this year in addition to other local victim centered trainings.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There were no laws, initiatives or policy changes in the Commonwealth regarding victim compensation during this reporting period. However, we have begun a deep analysis of proposed changes to our governing statute and regulations that allow for additional compensation of capped benefits and clarification/edification of our review process.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

The Victim Compensation & Assistance Division continues to coordinate with local prosecutors, law enforcement, local courts, U.S. Attorney s office, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance program and other criminal justice program in the Commonwealth to ensure that victims do not encounter barriers when applying to victim compensation. We developed and continue to maintain our contacts within these systems that were the outcome of our response to Boston Marathon Bombing incident. We offer trainings and consultation assistance to these entities and the victims that they serve. This ensures that victims are provided with the most up to date information about the program and our requirements. In turn, these close relationships assist the program in obtaining the necessary information to review applications for eligibility.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

This year the Division published its Compensation Application in Portuguese, Mandarin, Vietnamese and Haitian Creole in addition to our existing English and Spanish applications. This will greatly impact the program s ability to serve underserved communities in the Commonwealth. We are also working with the Office web developers to improve our presence on the Office website to help victims readily locate our program information. Finally, the division is working to implement our online application web portal that will increase our visibility on the web.
