Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Once an application is received, it is reviewed for completeness. The application is assigned to a caseworker who enters it in CVC system, which automatically assign a claim number. The caseworker contacts the victim or claimant in writing if any additional information is needed to process the claims. In the course of determining eligibility, the caseworker contacts law enforcement for a copy of the police report, conducts a Medicaid check contacts the prosecutor if an alleged offender is known, contacts providers to verify actual out of pocket crime related expenses (medical, funeral, counseling, loss of income/loss of support) Once the caseworker receives all of the needed information they make a recommendation on whether to pay or deny the claim. Management review the file and makes the final decision on the claims eligibility of compensation.
