1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**
Applications increased by 7.7% from the previous FFY. Ohio SB36 went into effect 3-1-22 which eliminated previous disqualifications, resulting in an increase in new claims by 9.5% from 4320 to 4733 in FFY22. FFY23 is the first full year reporting which received 5095 total new claims for 7.7% increase from previous FFY.

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. *Individuals may request crime victim compensation by submitting a paper application to the Ohio Attorney General's Office or applying electronically via an online portal. *A claims examiner reviews the application for completeness and contacts the applicant, as necessary to verify and/or obtain required information. *A Claim number is assigned, and an economic loss specialist and field specialist are assigned to the claim. *The economic loss specialist gathers/compiles information necessary to calculate a claimant's economic loss. This includes verification of expenses incurred and any benefits the claimant has received or is entitled to receive from any collateral source. *The Field specialist gathers/compiles information from law enforcement regarding the criminal conduct that is the basis for the claim, and verification of any evidence held, pertinent court dates, and any restitution ordered and/or paid by the offender. *An Assistant Attorney General reviews the information gathered/compiled by the specialists and issues a written Finding of Fact and Decision within 120 days after the claim was received by the Office. Claimants are notified of any time extensions. *A claimant may request reconsideration of the Finding of Fact and Decision within 30 days of receipt. Another Assistant Attorney General will conduct an independent review of the claim and issue a Final Decision within 60 days. *The Final Decision of the Attorney General's Office may be appealed to the Ohio Court of Claims. The decision of the Court of Claims is final.

5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**
The Crime Victim Services section works with advocates from the U.S. Attorney's office to assist victims with filing applications for compensation.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**
During this reporting period the Attorney General's Office continued to support communication with victims/applicants via an online portal to better facilitate claims processing. Additionally, the office has initiated a review of policies, procedures and organizational capacity, with the goal of creating a more victim-focused process.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**
No administrative funds are used from the grants. All grant funds are used to pay claims.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**
The Ohio Legislature passed Senate Bill 288 which: *Permits the Attorney General to grant an emergency award for funeral expenses to indigent claimants who will suffer undue hardship if immediate economic relief is not obtained. The Ohio Legislature passed House Bill 343 which: *Provides for additional court cost and bail for reparations fund. *Allows the court to order restitution in a juvenile delinquency offense. *Prohibits a court that has ordered restitution on an offender for a felony to discharge restitution until it is fully paid by the offender. *Requires that all money that remains unclaimed that is for the restitution payment for crime victims must be sent to the Reparations Fund with a list from the clerk specifying the amounts and individual identifying information of the money. The Ohio Legislature passed Senate Bill 16 which did the following: *Revised the format and content of the information provided to victims regarding crime victim compensation. *Modifies procedures for the law enforcement agencies upon initial contact with the victim, including materials and information that must be provided to the victim. *Specifies that the Crime Victim Bill of Rights must be made available Attorney General website. *Requires law enforcement agencies, upon initial contact, to provide the victim with the Victim's Rights Request Form, as well as the Crime Victim Bill of Rights Palm Card and the victim compensation information card.
9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**

Finding Words training was held on October 17-20, 2022 and March 6-10, 2023. This is an intensive forensic interview curriculum uses guidelines from the American Professional Society on the Abuse of Children and Office of Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention. Our Two Days In May Conference on Victim Assistance was held May 8-9, 2023. This 31st edition of the conference was attended by 976 people and included 35 workshops covering a wide range of topics such as understanding cultural barriers, supporting intimate partner violence survivors, trauma recovery centers, and ethics in advocacy. Our Office successfully closed out a grant from the U.S. Department of Justice, Office of Victims of Crime that brought to the state the Linking Systems of Care website, OhioHeals. The last major project for the grant was the production of a series of educational videos to help eliminate barriers to accessing advocates, services and the crime victim compensation program.

10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**

Outreach efforts during this reporting period focused on providing updated information to our community partners and law enforcement regarding the expanded eligibility for compensation. We have also conducted informal presentations to organizations who have not previously received training or who have onboarded new staff. The office will continue evaluating and improving its outreach efforts during the next reporting period.

Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 2743.69 requires Ohio Attorney General's Office to provide an annual update on the Ohio Victims of Crime Compensation Fund under sections 2743.51 to 2743.72 to the Governor, the President of the Senate, the Speaker of the House of Representatives, and the minority leaders of both houses.

12. **Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.**

Victims can request publication via our website, including the Crime Victim Rights Booklet, Crime Can be Costly palm cards (also in Spanish), VINE brochures, Applications and Resource Guides. We also provide translation into 350 different languages through Propio Language Services.
