Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. 1) New applications are received and entered into a database by a Claims Processor. 2) New workloads are evaluated for eligibility by the Claims Examiner and missing documentation is requested. 3) Claims Examiners submit reviewed claims with Decision recommendations to the Claims Supervisor. 4) The Claims Supervisor reviews all claims for accuracy and submits Claim Decision and Supporting Documentation to a five (5) member Board. 5) The Board reviews all claims for Approval or Denial leading to an Interim Decision. Interim Decision is mailed to the Claimant. 6) The Claimant has fifteen (15) days to Appeal an Interim Decision to the Board. Appealed Interim Decisions result in Hearings. The result of any Hearing may be to Affirm, Modify, or Reverse the Interim Decision. 7) After the fifteen days has elapsed the Interim Decision is forwarded to the Executive Director/Designee to be reviewed a signed resulting in a Final Decision.

4. Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.

The Department of Crime Victim Compensation is fortunate to be able to sustain current funding and staff levels to be able to meet the needs of crime victims.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

The Department of Crime Victim Compensation did not receive any requests for assistance from victims of federal crimes.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

As the Department of Crime Victim Compensation continues to evaluate the claims process flow, two minor adjustments were made to the 1st, 2nd and 4th steps of the process. The Victim Support/Intake section increase the number of times eligibility received complete applications and the processing services section changed how they receive eligible claims for payment by designating two routes in the system for claims with no invoices and claims with invoices.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

DCVC staff were fortunate to be able to attend the following conferences: NACVCB conference in Seattle, joint VOCA Compensation and Grants conference in Chicago, the Claims Processing conference in Oklahoma and the Language Access Plan training in Salt Lake City, UT. Staff was asked to provide take-aways from the conference so it could be share with the rest of DCVC employees. As a result of the LAP training, DCVC has formed a small working group to develop and implement an LAP for DCVC. They will have their first meeting at the end of November 2023.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

There were no laws, initiative, or policy changes regarding victim compensation in South Carolina.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

This reporting period DCVC concentrated efforts on increasing communication and improving relationships between DCVC and those victim advocates who assist victims with filling out applications. DCVC provided two, one-day regional trainings, one in West Columbia and one in Greenville. The training was designed to provide in-depth information about the claims process and the challenges to processing a claim quickly.

10. Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.

DCVC participated in a number of community events and conferences such as the Child Sexual/Physical Abuse Awareness event in Clarendon County, National Night Out in Laurens County, SC Victims' Rights Week in Columbia, SC, the SC Law Enforcement Victim Advocate Conference in Myrtle Beach, SC, the SC Funeral Directors' Association Conference and the SC Morticians Association Conference.
