NARRATIVE QUESTIONS

1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**
SD CVC steadily increased applications received since transferring from the Dept. of Social Services to the Department of Public Safety in 2019. The increases can be attributed to increased and improved relationships with our Victims' Services partners, improved processes, and a decrease in the return on requested information from Law Enforcement and Providers.
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. SDVS Compensation moved from an entirely hard paper file application file management system to an online application and data management system. Applications may be received through online submissions, mail, or digital copies may be provided via e-mail or fax. Upon receipt of an application, if required information is complete and eligible crime has been identified, a letter to law enforcement and providers are sent for verification of the information submitted on the application. When the law enforcement report is received, it is reviewed to ensure the information matches the application and that the crime is a compensable crime. Claim eligibility is determined by South Dakota Codified Law, Administrative Rules, Policy, and guidance provided by the Compensation Federal Register. A summary is completed by the claims specialist who provides a recommendation for the claim decision and sent to the program manager for review and approval. Expenses for approved claims are verified once provider information has been received. Denial letters are sent to claimants who do not meet compensation requirements with the option to appeal decisions to the Crime Victims' Compensation Commission.

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**
Although there are no notable trends - SD CVC continues to promote awareness to partners and crime victims on the processes and opportunities for CVC benefits.
5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**
SDVS Staff worked closely with FBI Victims Specialists, Federal Homeland Security Victims' Services, and the US Attorney's office within the state to ensure Federal crime victims are served. South Dakota is home to nine tribal nations where crimes are enforced under federal law. South Dakota has established a Victim Witness Subcommittee which meets bi-annually in the spring and fall. SD CVC provides updates and TA at this meeting. Federal Victims' Services partners, state and county-level system-based victims' specialists, as well as the state DV coalition members, are active attendees at each meeting.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**
In January 2021 SDVS transitioned to the new MAVIS online application and data management system. This has notably increased the efficiency of claims management and has provided better tools to analyze trends going forward. Additionally, the increased awareness and technical assistance provided to VS partners and VOCA subgrantees have contributed to improved processes.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**
Administrative funds were used for personnel salary and fringe benefits, Travel costs to attend the annual VOCA Assistance and Compensation National Conference, and technology enhancements to improve our data management system for improved efficiencies of our data management system.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**
SDVS DPS worked with the Legislative Research Council (LRC) to update minor "clean-up" language to state administrative rules however, there was no significant impact with the updates.
9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**

The Office of Victims Services under DPS has shown improvement in relationships with Law Enforcement. We are receiving law enforcement verification information in less time from many agencies. We have received positive feedback from Law Enforcement, Prosecution, tribal agencies as well as multiple systems and shelter-based victims' services providers regarding the noticeable increase of support, training and technical assistance, and victim-centered practices SDVS has adopted in the last 4 years. The SDVS Program Director administers VOCA Victim Assistance and Victims Compensation, as well as FVPSA, STOP, SASP, State DASA funds, and Access and Visitations funding. We find valuable benefits to having VOCA Assistance and Compensation under the same department as this assists in guiding compensation victims to shelter programs that may be able to assist beyond what compensation requirements allow.

10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**

SDVS and the CVC Staff have seized opportunities through online meetings and training events to provide for continuity of awareness activities. SDVS Continues to partner with the SD Network Against Family Violence as the state-designated coalition, to host bi-weekly meetings to provide updates and support, which often includes CVC awareness opportunities. SDVS will continue instituting new outreach and awareness of the online application system which was live in January 2021.
