Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Upon receipt of a compensation application, a claim with a unique claim ID is created by UOVC s Support Staff within UOVC s claim processing database, and the claims are assigned on a rotating basis to UOVC s Reparation Officers for review. The applicant is informed in writing (unless they request otherwise) that their claim has been received and is being processed. When a claim is created, a request for an investigative report is sent to the agency investigating the crime. UOVC s Victim Advocates monitor pending police report requests and send follow-up requests as needed, working to build the full kit that UOVC s Reparation Officers need to determine the eligibility of a claim. Once a police report is received for a given claim, Reparation Officers will review and summarize the police reports within the compensation database, and will use the information provided in the report to determine if the incident in question qualifies for compensation and if the applicant is eligible to receive reparations. They may also request supplemental police reports or contact law enforcement, prosecutors, and other professionals as needed to determine both eligibility and that the victim is cooperating with the investigation and prosecution of the crime. UOVC s Reparation Officers, Victim Advocates, and Reparations Program Manager/Assistant Director hold weekly staff meetings to discuss the eligibility of difficult or unusual claims. UOVC s Reparation Officers will then either approve or deny a claim. After this step, the applicant will be informed in writing (unless they request otherwise) either that their claim has been approved, and if so how to seek specific benefits, or that their claim has been denied, and if so that they have a statutory right to formally appeal the denial if they so choose.

Rising housing costs in the state. The CVRA Board authorized an increase in the administrative rule cap regarding relocation benefits from \$1,000.00 to \$2,000.00. The updated Rule became effective December 8, 2023.

5. Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.

Victims of all crimes are eligible to apply for the program. The vast majority of applications come from referrals from victim advocates based in local, state and federal law enforcement, prosecution and court agencies. UOVC assigns all federal and tribal cases to one reparation officer, which helps establish and maintain working relationships with outside partners. This past year, that reparation officer, Tisha Littlewood was presented with an award of appreciation from the United States Attorney for Utah, for going above and beyond to build these relationships with federal and tribal partners and for her care and dedication to victims of federal crimes as well as victims and victim issues within our Tribal communities and members.

6. Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.

Members of the compensation team participate in the Statewide Advocates for Victims Organization (SWAVO) quarterly training and collaboration meetings which are held around the state. This past year, there has been a focus on holding listening sessions with victims and victim service providers in Utah's communities, for the purpose of facilitating change and improvement to all victim services, including victim compensation.

Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.

UOVC uses VOCA administrative funds to support attendance in the training and collaboration events described in other sections and other related training. The UOVC has used some administrative funds to support rent, technology enhancements and other expenses essential to developing and maintaining improved compensation services.

8. Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.

In the past legislative session, eligibility criteria around reporting requirements for victims of sex crimes and domestic violence crimes were decreased. This has resulted in victims of rape and sexual assault being eligible for victim compensation benefits by merely reporting to victim advocates, rather than police. Victims of DV who are strangled become eligible for compensation by seeking emergency medical care for the strangulation and are not required to report to the police.

9. Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.

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In Addition to the responses provided in questions 3, 6 and 7, UOVC has made consistent outreach efforts to vulnerable and underserved populations. We ve continually increased our relationships with agencies that work with plural families and are getting more applications from victims in bigamous marriages than we have gotten previously

We have a UOVC Facebook page and YouTube channel. We are also part of a Facebook Victim Advocate page for Utah. Our office does assist in outside agency trainings such as one hosted by the Utah Coalition Against Sexual Assault to help bring awareness of what UOVC does to help victims. We do trainings for our Victim Assistance Academy, various law enforcement, prosecutors offices, shelters, per request. Approximately 18-20 trainings per year.
