1. **Please explain any significant change in the number of applications received during the reporting period.**
There was no significant change in the number of applications for the federal fiscal year 2023 (October 2022 thru September 2023).
2. **The average length of time to process an application for claim eligibility for compensation**
Count days from time of receipt of application to decision. 25

Please explain your state's procedure for processing an application for claim eligibility, from time of receipt of application to decision. Claims are received either through the online portal, fax or mail, the digital images are entered into database system and reviewed for completeness and for signature. Staff request missing signatures. If police report (PR) is not attached, we request one. When PR and signature are both received and are in claim file, then the claim is assigned and referred to the claim's unit for adjudication. Claims Manager determines if the claim meets eligibility criteria and asks for additional information if needed. Claims are allowed or denied based on our eligibility criteria. Treatment may or may not have already taken place. Allowed claims remain open as long a victim is still in need of treatment for the allowed crime. Claim Managers monitor and manage the claims for authorized treatments and wage loss payments, until a medical/mental health provider determines treatment is complete.

4. **Please describe any emerging/major issues or notable trends that were encountered in your state that had an impact on your program's ability to meet the needs of crime victims during the reporting period.**
Currently 95% of our staff telework. We continue to adjust to our new hybrid work environment while striving to meet our customer s needs. We are also dealing with staffing shortage as told to us by law enforcement and advocacy groups.
5. **Please describe in detail efforts taken to serve Victims of Federal Crime during the reporting period.**
All claims are treated the same and not broken down into State Federal crimes. In an effort to get crime information as timely as possible, we work with law enforcement, advocates and Victim/Witness Coordinators to obtain this information. We will specifically reach out to federal Victim Witness Coordinators in cases where other jurisdictions are unable to release the information we need. Federal victim coordinators have our phone numbers on speed dial.
6. **Please describe any notable activities during the reporting period that improved the process of victim compensation services.**
We continue to look for ways to improve automation and technology to better serve our clients. We have also recently developed and began implementing a 6-year Strategic Plan that we believe will not only help us meet our performance goals but improve the culture of our work environment and the quality of our staff s work life balance.
7. **Please describe in detail ways in which your state used VOCA Administrative funds and the impact of these funds on the state's ability to improve victim compensation services during the reporting period.**
We do not use any VOCA funds for administrative costs. All funds go to benefits.
8. **Were there any laws, initiatives, or policy changes in your state regarding victim compensation during the reporting period? If yes, please briefly describe them and their impact.**
In the 2023 legislative session a bill was passed that would grant homicide survivor families addition counseling session under the victims claim. Previously 12 sessions per family member were granted. The legislation allows for more than 12 if a mental health provider deems that patient would benefit from addition sessions. In 2023 another bill passed that removed the expiration date on a prior law that allowed for coverage of DV near fatal strangulation exams. These exams are now permanently covered and paid for by CVC in the same manner as SA exams.
9. **Please describe system-coordination efforts with prosecutors, law enforcement, courts, U.S. attorneys' offices, tribal systems, State VOCA Victim Assistance Coordinator, or other key personnel within the criminal justice system in your state to reduce barriers to victims who may apply to receive victim compensation.**
During Legislative session (January thru April), we meet weekly with stakeholders to discuss proposed bills and other issues. We work with prosecutors and advocates at prosecutors offices at all levels to obtain police reports on a timely basis. We also work closely with prosecutors to award restitution to CVC for claim cost, thereby holding offenders responsible for the costs. In 2022/23 we also worked closely with our counterpart at the state VOCA assistance program in their anti-human trafficking workgroup. This led to the creation of a one-page fact sheet about the CVC program for use by the NW Justice Project immigration lawyers working with trafficking victims. The fact sheet was translated into 9 languages.
10. **Please explain any public outreach efforts to improve awareness of your program.**

Our program participates in several victim service committees, such as the Department of Corrections Victim Counsel. This is a group of system and community-based advocates, and state programs, to discuss victim needs and barriers to services. We provide outreach to any group wanting formal training or informational meetings about our program. This year we focused on continuing to meet with forensic nurses and billing staff who often have confusion over how to bill. The purpose of the meetings was for providers to have the best chance of submitting correct bills that can be paid quickly.

11. **Please list any other outcome measure(s) that are reported to the governor, legislature, or other state entity that have not been reported in this submission. Provide the actual measure(s). The data may be reported separately in your progress report.**

We measure average days to pay bills from the date we receive a bill to when it is paid. In the Federal Fiscal Year 2022, average days was 19 and 18 days in Federal Fiscal Year 2023.

12. **Please provide any additional comments that are helpful to improving the Victim Compensation state and/or federal program.**

We continue to look for ways to meet the challenges of serving victims better. We are in the process of finalizing our 6-year strategic plan. The plan will include strategies for increasing our outreach efforts and process improvement. With the increase in violent crime over the last few years, our program continually seeks input and works with our stakeholders to help increase both our notoriety and accessibility. The mission of our program is to reduce hardships for victims of violent crime, and we take this to heart.
